## Dear Friends,

Greetings. I am writing at the tail end of my second bout with Covid. Although the second time around is less severe, it does serve as a reminder that the pandemic is not totally behind us. I am grateful for the words of encouragement and support you have extended me during this time.

Among the things I have been contemplating while biking across the country this summer, is how we can make our worship at St. John's more meaningful and welcoming. The collect taken from our Book of Common Prayer for Proper 28 offers thanksgiving for scripture;

Blessed, Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have give us in our Savior Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. Scripture is central to all Episcopal worship. We have included four passages of scripture in every Eucharist; Old Testament, Psalm, Epistle, and Gospel. Sometimes there is a theme linking these passages, often there is not. Including such diverse passages in every liturgy makes it hard to focus on anyone of them. It is particularly difficult to compose a sermon which contains reference to all the passages, demonstrates their relevance to our contemporary context, and can be given in less than 12 minutes. Often, each passage of scripture contains disturbing pronouncements which demands a comment and exploration. My choice, as a preacher, is between preaching 40 minute sermons or ignore some challenging scriptural reference. Neither of these options gives Glory to God, edifies the mind, or furthers the Kingdom in this place very effectively.

I have decided that for a season, starting in October, we will focus on only one passage plus the psalm. This will be embracing a practice common to the Presbyterian, Baptist, and Pentecostal traditions. This will provide us with the opportunity to focus on a particular passage in greater depth. For the month of October, we will continue to read passages from Matthew's Gospel. When, in December, we enter the new liturgical year, we will focus on Mark's Gospel. In January we will shift and focus on St. Paul's first Epistle to the Corinthians. During this time, I would like to provide opportunity for members of the congregation to express what

Saugus Welcomes Is looking for some help!
In December 2021, the Saugus community welcomed an Afghan refugee family. The father of the family had been employed by the U.S. government in Kabul; however, the fall of the Afghan government and takeover by the Taliban put the family in jeopardy. Our government evacuated them in the massive airlift in August 2021. They left everything behind, arriving with only what they could bring in a few suitcases. The family of parents and six children is currently being housed by the East Saugus United Methodist Church. Saugus Welcomes, a multi-denominational, volunteer group, is assisting them to resettle in our community. The family spoke almost no English when they arrived.

Members of Saugus Welcomes are providing English lessons, transportation for medical visits and grocery shopping, and other similar assistance. The four school aged children love school and are doing well as they quickly learn English. Their father works full time at Target. The federal refugee benefits provided for the first year after resettlement expired at the end of 2022. The family relies on the father's wages, food stamps, and some state aid to pay for rent, food, clothing, and necessities. This assistance is insufficient to support a family of eight in Saugus. Saugus Welcomes asks for your financial support to help our neighbors as they integrate into American life and become self-sustaining, contributing members of our community. Funds raised will go toward rent, utilities, food, and other necessities of life.
